














GLOBAL GRANT LIFE CYCLE

The lifecycle of a Rotary grant



Draft

Rotary members plan a project or scholarship and build their grant application online

Authorization

Club and district leaders review the application and authorize funding

Submitted

The grant's planners submit the application to The Rotary Foundation

Approved

If the grant is approved, the Foundation issues payment

Completion

Members carry out the project, reporting to the Foundation annually until the work or studies are finished and the grant is closed

Rotary Club hands over E1.2m project to co-op

KALANGA - Norway Lurvick Rotary Club yesterday handed over a garden and water project, together with a tractor, worth E1.2 million to members of the Buhlebemntfwana Vegetable Gardens Co-operative at Kalanga area.

The exact amount that was spent on the water system and the tractor was E1 235 000.

Rolf Dovle was in the company of Arboe Hoeg Sigurd when he made the official handover of the project to Lubombo Regional Secretary Jane Mkhonta.

Also present during the event were SOS Villages National Director Lauretta Mkhonta, Malkerns Valley Rotary Club President Comfort Mndebele, SOS KaLanga Village Director Mkhawulo Hlubi and Malkerns Valley Rotary Club Programme Manager Mandla Mlipha. The water system consists of water storage tanks and boreholes with two pumps worth E830 000, while the ablution rooms and vegetable storage

room with an office was built for E105 000. The tractor is worth E300 000.

The water storage facility stores about 50 000 litres which irrigates the vegetables namely butternut, beetroot, green pepper, spinach, maize to mention a few. Dolve further handed over two ablution blocks and a new borehole and a pump, including a new Home Economic class

with a kitchen to St Paul's Catholic Primary School committee led by the Head teacher, Khanyisile Mayisa.

Dolve expressed his gratitude in handing over the projects that would change lives of the members of the co-operative and the pupils at the school to the better.

He further thanked SOS Villages management for successfully coordinating

the projects in ensuring that they were a success. "I am pleased with the final handover of these projects because they would be fundamental to the lives of the beneficiaries. It is my great pleasure to see that more people will now lead a positive life by generating income that will sustain their livelihoods," he said.

Malkerns Valley Rotary Club Programme Manager Mlipha also thanked Dolve for his generosity in donating the money that ensured that the projects were a success.

Families

"About 15 families will benefit from the garden project. The produce is sold to NAMBoard and some to the local community members. We will guide the members for the next 10 years to ensure sustainability and then move on to develop another community," he said.

The co-operative's Chairman Gcina Ndzimandze thanked the Norway Lurvick Rotary Club for changing their lives as a community.

"We are now able to feed our families as well as ensure that our children's school fees is paid," he said.
